Principal's Report

Reflecting on our Success

Last week we had a visit from Mr Mark Scott, the Secretary of the NSW Department of Education. He chose to visit our school as he had heard about all the wonderful things that are happening at Killarney. He was here so we could share our successes and challenges with him, it is heartening to have the head of the Department, actually come to the coalface and listen to real teachers.



Of course we shared our recent HSC results, with not only the great results in English, but across all HSC areas. He spent some time in Ms Rose's Year 12 English class, where they were creating opening paragraphs for their upcoming HSC questions. The student answers were phenomenal.

We also showed Mr Scott how we are excelling in technology, where he saw Year 10 Music playing their compositions for their assessment task. Noah's piece that he composed to a clip from Toy Story was amazing.

In Year 10 IST, he saw students showing off their final films. Dmitri's green screen effect, putting his friend in a fighter plane was amazing. I believe that students that are creating such great works are using the 21st Century skills that will equip them for the future.

The drama class also showed how they were using the skills of communicating, collaborating, critical thinking and co-operation, as they played drama games whilst Mr Scott was talking to their teacher Ms Grugan.

I did bring up the challenges that we face: that is increasing mental health issues and how schools are ill equipped to deal with severe cases. I also informed Mr Scott of the difficulties in getting funding for basic repairs (such as the toilets) and the insane amount of paperwork to get such work done. A further challenge is finding teachers that can afford to live in this area: we are often short of Science, TAS and Maths teachers.

This is the final week of celebrations for Year 12, we have our last classes on Monday and Tuesday and a fun day on Wednesday with bubble soccer. On Thursday we say our farewells to Year 12 in the graduation ceremony, where we reward those who have given so much to the school, prizes for academic effort, for sport, for citizenship and leadership. As there are so many talented well deserving students at Killarney Heights High School, it was a hard choice selecting students for each award.

The HSC is a highly valued qualification. To gain an HSC is an honour, it is a well-recognised qualification that will help students get a job, or be admitted to university or other institutions. They have earned this, they have worked hard, now is the time to celebrate!

Following graduation is the Year 12 formal at Taronga Park Zoo, which will be attended by staff and students. I'm looking forward to seeing our young people dressed up (and suddenly so much older in suits). I'm sure there will be a tear in our eyes as we suddenly realize that these young people are adults and ready for the world.

Mr Matt Murphy was presented with an Executive Director's award last week at a ceremony in Epping.



Since 2018, Matt has led the school in the Instructional Rounds model as part of our school transformation process. He has formed teams of mixed faculty teachers to observe teaching practice in a collaborative, non-judgemental way. He has led the analysis of the observations to inform us of our problems of practice and patterns of learning and where these need to be

addressed. He has ensured the participation of all staff, motivating and inspiring them to focus on whole school improvement. His compassionate instructional leadership, his organisation and superb people skills have meant that teachers are improving in their practice; his focused work has put effective pedagogy at the forefront of what we teachers do at Killarney Heights High School.

Under his leadership, each faculty is responsible for targeted professional development of the staff allowing opportunities for leadership and the sharing of pedagogical knowledge and practice. Through this process, we are now confident that professional learning is translated to the classroom. Credit for the thoughtful application of professional learning, for the desire to improve the problem of practice and for following a strong moral compass for school improvement for students and teachers is credit Matt deserves.

He has led the evolution of this program to the Instructional Rounds for students. This student voice has empowered students to take responsibility for their own learning, teaching others how to learn and how to become better learners themselves. Matt works with the whole school community, addressing challenges calmly and cooperatively, and bringing out the best in others and positively contributing to making the school a great place to learn to be a lifelong learner.

If you're thinking about applying to uni then you've got two weeks to get your applications in before the early bird applications close. After 30 September (up until applications close on 7 February 2020), the fee goes up to \$200.

You can always change your course preferences later but you'll save money if you get your application in now.

EAS (Educational Access Scheme) aims to help students whose education has been negatively affected during Year 11 and/or Year 12 receive an offer to university. To apply for the EAS you must be able to demonstrate that your Year 11 and/or Year 12 studies have been negatively affected for a period of at least six months, as a result of circumstances beyond your control or choosing

If you are applying and need to get an **EIS** (Educational Impact Statement) from a teacher then it is advisable to organise this statement ASAP. Please see Ms McDermott if you need any more information.


