Principal's Report



Students are now setting in after their time in isolation. Learning in most subjects is back to normal which is great for both students and teachers. The situation in Victoria this week is a reminder that we must remain vigilant with our hygiene measures so that we don't end up back in lockdown.

One side effect of the lockdown is that students have become unused to wearing full uniform. Our good reputation is built partly on how our students appear when they are out and about in the community. Wearing hoodies and track pants might be suitable for lessons at home, but is not acceptable attire for school. I understand it has been difficult with many of the shops closed, but the uniform shop is open with full stock. We are asking for parents to encourage all students to wear full school uniform.

Reports for all years are either being issued now or in the next few weeks. Unfortunately our attendance system could not record student absences accurately over this period, so please don't be concerned about the attendance figures. Some subjects have found it difficult to assess students in the usual way this semester, but have been able to award a grade instead.

Our teachers are currently working on updating their teaching and learning programs for students. Our main aim is for students to learn more deeply, to understand the why of what they are learning, to be challenged so that the new knowledge is integrated into what they already know. This is not an easy task – it takes hours even weeks for teachers to write a new unit of work. To ensure consistency and quality of the teaching programs, we have given teachers an extra hour per week to learn about how to do this, and then to write the teaching programs. Our aim is for all teaching programs to be explicit and challenging, so that students will have optimal learning outcomes.

Finally some good news! The renovation of the laboratories in E block have begun. The 50 year old labs have been demolished and the building has started with the project expected to take about 16 weeks. We all need to say a big thank you to both you and to the P&C for their generous donation so this renewal could be done, these laboratories will cost \$624 000, with the P&C funding half of this cost. 75% of the P&C fees go directly to school building projects, these can be claimed as a tax deductible expense.

We are so fortunate to be in a community that supports our school in all ways. Once again thank you.

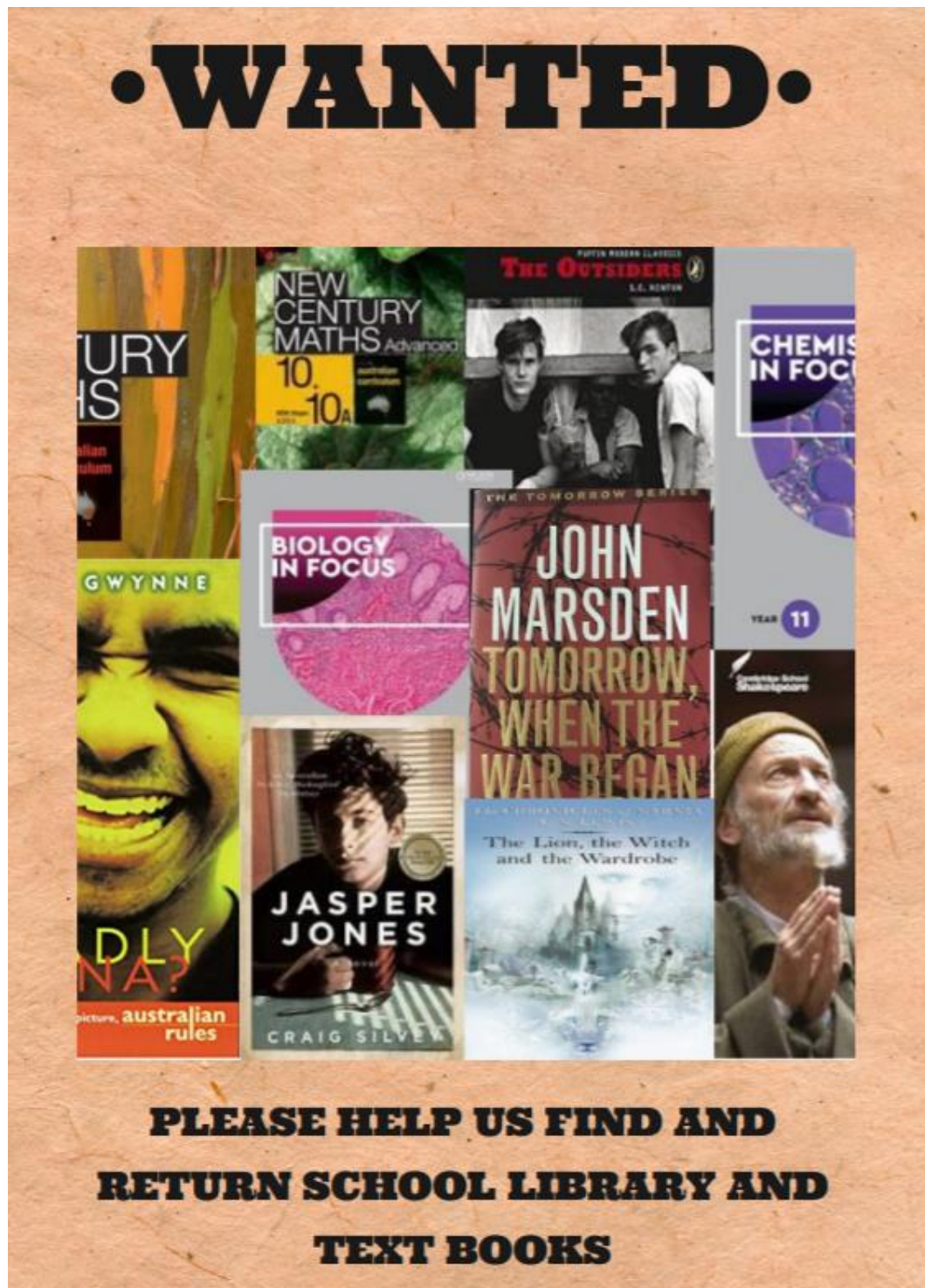

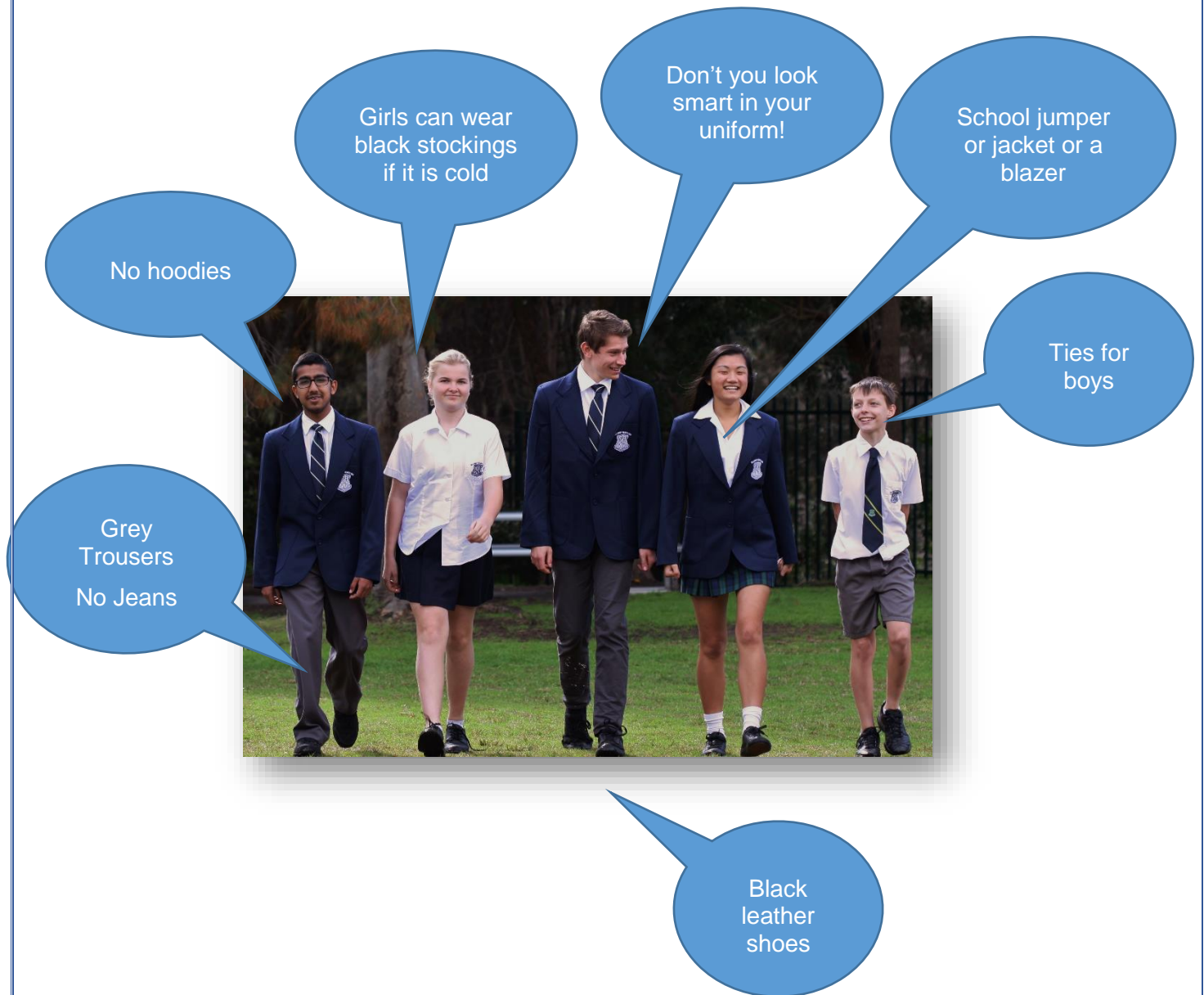

Uniform – Wear it Proudly



Dress for Success

It has been so heartening to welcome students back to school this week and we are so happy to have our classrooms full of activity once again.

We have high expectations of our students when it comes to their uniform and we'd like to extend our thanks to the vast majority of students who wear their uniform with pride. It is thanks to the support of our parents and carers that standards remain high and this is something regularly commented on by our visitors.

This letter is to remind our students and their family of the uniform requirements, particularly as we move into the cooler winter months. We know it can be difficult to keep track of uniform requirements as the seasons change so we hope the following provides some clarity around what students should be wearing to school each day.

Junior Uniform

Option 1: grey school shorts or grey school long pants - white shirt and tie - school jumper/jacket – black leather shoes.

Option 2: plain navy skirt and white blouse - black tights - or long navy pants and white blouse - school jumper/jacket – black leather shoes.

Senior Uniform

Option 1: checked skirt, white blouse, black tights - or long navy pants and white blouse - school jumper/jacket/Year 12 jersey – black leather shoes.

Option 2: grey school shorts or grey school long pants - white shirt and senior boys tie - school jumper/jacket/Year 12 jersey – black leather shoes.

Sport Uniform

Sports day only: plain blue school sports shorts - white school polo shirt - plain blue track-pants - school jumper/jacket.

Uniform items can be purchased at the uniform shop on Tuesday between 7.30AM and 12PM and Thursday between 11AM and 3PM. Thank you once again for your support in maintaining out high standards of presentation and positive reputation within the local community.

Vaccinations

NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2020 the following vaccines will be offered. *Please note the revised date for the Year 10 vaccine:*

YEARS	VACCINE	NUMBER OF DOSES	DATE
Year 7	Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine	2-doses at least 6 months apart	20 Feb and 11 Sept
	Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine	Single dose	20 Feb
Year 10	Meningococcal ACWY vaccine	Single dose	21 August

Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to parents/guardians. To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- read all the information provided
- complete the consent form, including signing their name next to the vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
- return the completed consent form to their child's school
- ensure that their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Please note that if a student is absent from a clinic they will be offered any missed doses at subsequent clinics during Year 7 or 8 (for HPV and dTpa vaccination) and during Year 10 (for Meningococcal ACWY vaccination). **They do not need to go to their GP for these vaccines because they are absent from a clinic.**

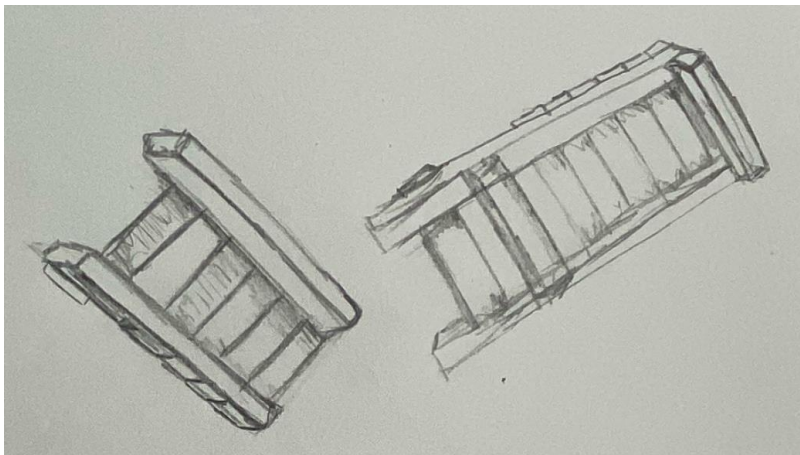

Year 9 Industrial Technology – Timber

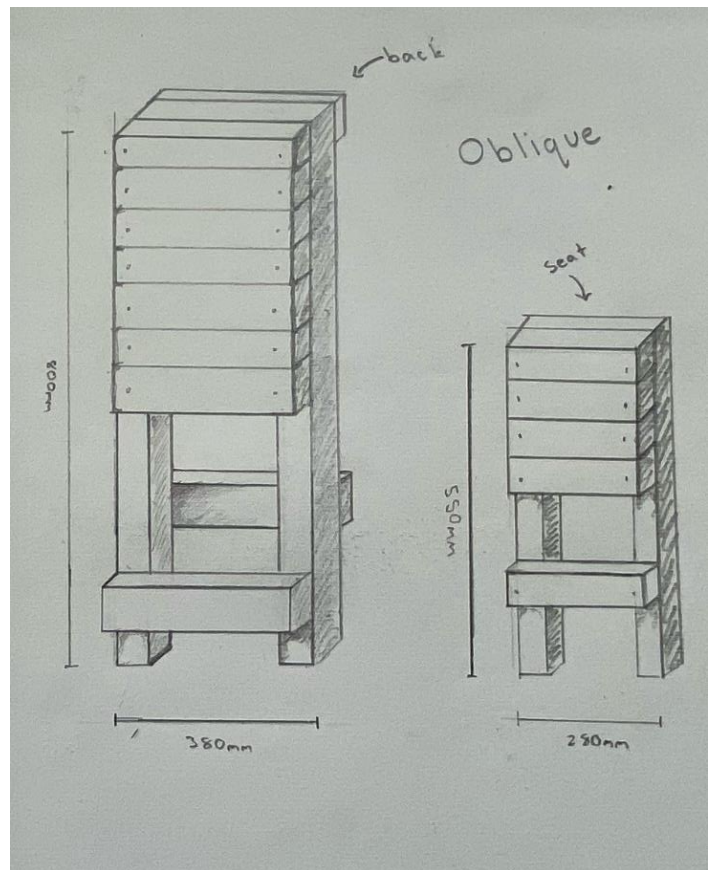
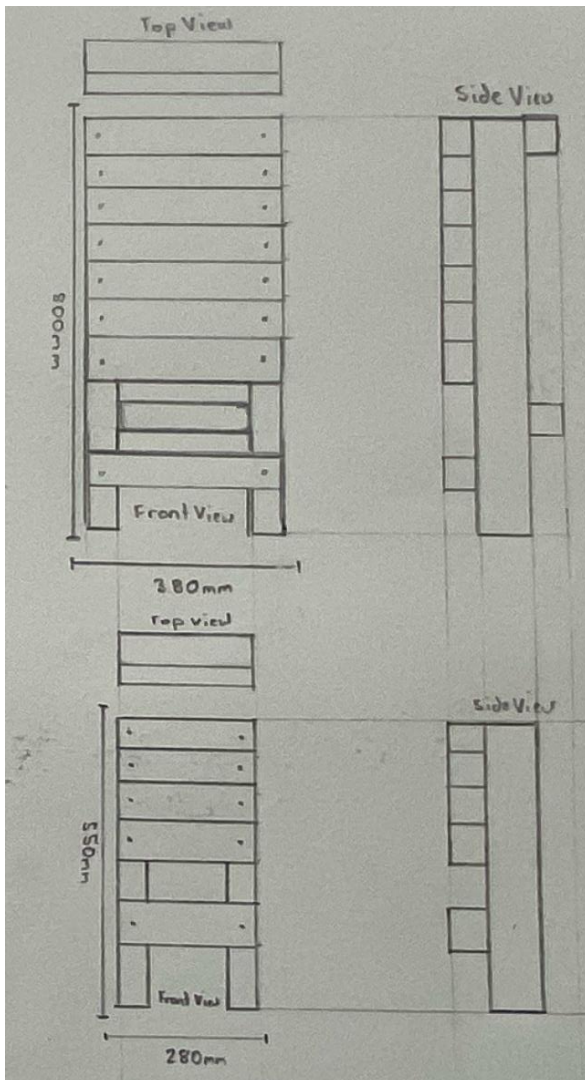
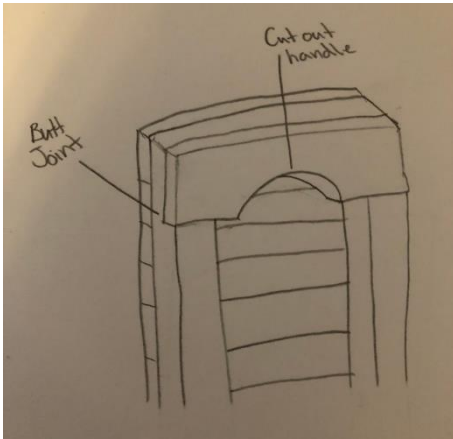

I think Drama is an important subject because it teaches you skills for the future.

Drama helps improve your communication skills, teamwork, dialogue, negotiation, social skills, confidence; it fuels your imagination and provides you with tools to better express yourself.

Drama helps you collaborate. You have to share your ideas and help each other so you can get things done and accomplish acting skills. Drama is about a lot of teamwork. Science



Watt's up in Science

Since returning to school things in Science are back in full swing with practical demonstrations and exciting experiments happening across all year groups! Of course there is hand sanitiser a plenty in all science labs and equipment is being disinfected between classes, but aside from the increased vigilance with hygiene and disinfecting equipment our science classes are back to being as hands on and engaging as ever!

So far this term:

Year 7 have been exploring natural resources, making their own paper and investigating alternative energy sources, setting up wind turbines and water wheels. Year 8 has explored energy transformations, designing Rube Goldberg machines and setting up electrical circuits. Year 9 has dived into climate science conducting experiments on the greenhouse effect and ocean acidification. While, year 10 has been exploring genetics and cellular processes by extracting DNA from strawberries, modelling mitosis and observing cell division under the microscope.

In our senior science courses the physicists have been thinking hard, conducting through experiments on relativity. In Chemistry students have been conducting precipitation reactions and building their own galvanic cells. Biology has student taking a detailed look at cellular structures, engaging in lots of microscope work and constructing models of cell membranes. Earth and environmental science has been investigating density, modelling ocean currents and conducting pollen analysis to learn about past climates. In Marine studies the labs have been smelling a little "fishy", with students getting their hand dirty and performing a fish dissection to investigate the anatomy and physiology of fish.
